Gadding About

Our theme for August is Insight and Wisdom. There are so many ways to approach this theme, and so much that can spark insights and wisdom in our lives.

What are the sources that inspire you in your search for truth and meaning?

During the last general session of the UUA General Assembly, members of the Article II Study Commission (www.uua.org/a2sc) shared their VERY preliminary, draft concept for the "sources" section of Article II of the UUA Bylaws and invited people to provide feedback. [Watch the video of their presentation here, starting at 44:50.] They shared their insights that some formats are conducive to growth and some prohibit growth. The current statement of our sources is in a list format. As ours is an ever-evolving and growing religion, they offered an example of a less specific, more open format for our sources of inspiration. As a religiously pluralistic faith, a singular list is limiting. Their initial DRAFT language offers a singular statement for our feedback ... it will undoubtedly change between now and the final proposal the Study Commission presents in their final draft for delegate consideration at the UUA General Assembly in Pittsburgh, PA in June 2023. I offer it here for you to contemplate how this inspires your search for truth and meaning.

"As Unitarian Universalists, we draw upon, and are inspired by the full depth and breadth of sacred understanding, as experienced by humanity. Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches our faith,

we are inspired to ever deepen and expand our wisdom."

This month, our worship services and our Covenant Group conversations will invite you to consider what sources and life experiences you engage with for insight and wisdom. My own spiritual journey is taking me deeper into Buddhist teachings, and I'm deeply inspired by the science and technology that has brought us images of thunderstorms on Jupiter and the plethora of galaxies in Galaxy Cluster SMACS J0723. We are seeing galaxies as they looked 300 to 400 million years after the Big Bang. I look at the image of the galaxy cluster with great awe at the vastness of ... everything. Buddhism teaches and trains me to be more mindful of this moment ... this now – who I'm with, what I'm doing, what I'm sensing. The Webb images inspire humility - this split second moment of time in which I breathe in and breathe out is so infinitesimal in the context of all that is, was, and ever will be. Somewhere between that vastness and this brief moment, I discover some profound truths about the meaning and purpose for my life – to be awake, to serve, and to be grateful, for a start.

One of the most important tools that the board has for discerning that direction is the set of open questions that are developed during and following the retreat. These are questions that we will bring to the congregation in hopes of gaining direction from them. After much discussion, we have settled on the following three open questions for this year, which will help determine programming and direction for the 2023-2024 program year.

- How will we address our aging facility, and our desire to grow, in order to ensure a sustainable future?
- What outreach would you be willing to get involved in to promote expansion in the community?
- What Social Justice and Equity issues require greater emphasis?

Over the next few months, we will work to collect answers to those questions from as many people at UUCG as possible. We look forward to hearing from you!

Of course, there is a significant issue these do not directly address—the ongoing Covid—19 pandemic continues to challenge us and UUCG's policies and procedures related to it will continue to evolve along with the changing situation. We would love to return to many of our pre-pandemic practices, such as monthly potlucks and offering nursery care during services. We are equally aware that case counts and hospitalizations due to Covid—19 are once again rising in our area. With Gwinnett County having returned to a "High" risk level and the CDC recommending that masks should be worn indoors, we hope that everyone will make prudent decisions to protect themselves and others. In this context, we are maintaining our current policies and will continue to keep a close watch on the situation.

Water

I have been thinking a lot about water lately, in part because it's been abnormally hot this summer and I have a lot of plant pots to water. I have emptied half of my rain barrels already and we are just at the beginning of July! I do feel grateful to have rain when it comes.

We visited Salt Lake City this past month and they aren't kidding when they say it's a dry heat in Utah. The Great Salt Lake is drying up, partially as a result of the drought in the southwest but I was told that there has been a lot of development upstream at the same time.

The waters that would replenish the lake are being used elsewhere. I have also heard of the drought in Mexico, effecting people for weeks at a time. Commercial interests have been given preferential treatment when it comes to the water supply.

More locally, I was disappointed to learn of the Georgia Supreme Court decision not to hear the case that the Sierra Club brought against Georgia Power over the company's coal ash pond cleanup. Georgia Power intends to pass along some of the cost of clean-

up to its customers, who paid for the coal-powered plants and ash ponds when they were built. And the company's request to be overseen by the Georgia State Dept of Environmental Protection was also approved, removing them from Federal EPA regulation.

The link that I have included above goes to an extensive article about the water in a coal ash pond. Not all of Georgia Power's ponds have the kind of liners needed to keep the arsenic, lead, and mercury out of the ground water in counties in Georgia. Many Georgians rely on wells for their drinking water which have since become contaminated.

It would be a good time to remember that we all live downstream.

Message from the Lay Minister

What does it mean when we say, "Connecting Beyond our Walls"? I think it means the ways we work to create the beloved community as an extension of living out our values in the world. As Unitarian Universalists, in general, we do not evangelize but prefer to live out our values in the wider world. We currently have activities in place to provide Charity in our community like our work with Corley elementary and the donations to the Lawrenceville Ministry Co-Op. Some of us continue to donate to El Refugio, the shelter and ministry for immigrants in detention, or have completed Education on immigrant rights (and the lack of rights), or provided Direct Service through visitation with Immigrants in detention. Living our values in the wider community also includes our work of Advocacy with the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance and Gwinnett Remembrance Coalition; these groups honor interconnectedness in the web of life. There is more including: Pride Events; Mystic South; Protests, etc. Living out our values means considering the principles we support and affirm as well as following these principles as we explore their ongoing meaning.




