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The Path of Spirituality and Secularism




If we have been led to think of a spectrum between secularism and spirituality, what if we instead see the relationship between the two as a **starburst**?

Or maybe laundry is a spiritual practice for you, but cooking is just a chore. Your starburst may look very different. But both of these starbursts show a level of spirituality as well as a level of secularism.

Think about what the points on your starburst are. What are areas of your life that haven't felt spiritual to you before?

Try switching. What does it feel like to treat your spiritual practice as something secular? What about trying something you've always seen as disconnected from spirituality, but framing it as a spiritual practice?

We welcomed four new members of the Board of Trustees this year at our annual Leadership Retreat at The Mountain. We gathered with the Lay Ministers to grow our relationships, share in our vision of the congregation's future, and discuss how we can serve the congregation and our community. The work ,collaborating with each other, will help bring our congregation into the future and pave the groundwork for the next chapter of our work in the community.

The goals developed at the leadership retreat will engage, restore, and reimagine the Projecting Our Vision into the Future work that was done in 2019 and 2020 to create the document <u>Projecting Our Vision</u>. Our gratitude goes out to all those that served on the Board of Trustees and Lay Ministers these past years; your commitment to the congregation has deepened our work and helped us become more efficient for the congregation and the community.

When we started this new governance model in 2020, the Board of Trustees worked hard to provide us with all the tools necessary to develop the open questions that are so important to create during the leadership retreat. And so, we gathered together, shared our vision, and developed the three questions that will strengthen our congregation and community in the coming years. After planning and discussion we settled on these three open questions to help determine the programing and direction for the 2024-2025 program year:

- How do we envision the future of our ministry?
- How will we expand and strengthen our multicultural/multigenerational inclusivity and engagement?
- What does a financially healthy congregation look like to you?

Over the next year we will engage these questions in various ways during Congregational Conversations on the first Sunday of the Month, with a few Conversations devoted to the UU General Assembly to discuss the proposal for the revisions to Article II of the UUA Bylaws. We have discussed a plan to present these questions, to have deep and fruitful conversations with everyone on multiple platforms. This work is so important for the congregation to

engage in, everyone's feedback helps us to consider a new and creative way to carve and restore the path we were gifted so long ago.

Bruce Anderson of the Core Gift Institute said, "The courage to participate with others in reciprocal gift exchange is at the core of hope, both in individuals and in our collective lives together. The hope that we will not simply survive, but thrive, if we believe that all of us have gifts worthy of leading with. There is abundance all around us all the time."

Georgians for a Healthy Future

Report From General Assembly

This year's dual-platform General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association, in Pittsburgh/via Zoom, was held over four days in June and attended by 4,000+ UUs, over half of whom were delegates. UUCG's delegates attended all the General (business) Sessions, and we split up to attend workshops. Most of us also attended most of the five worship services.

GA Business

We elected a new UUA president for a six-year term. Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt is the first out queer individual and the first woman of color elected to the role. She says, "Unitarian Universalism has a vital, liberating message for our time. Our nation and denomination are experiencing challenges in a time of significant division, change, and radicalization. But together...we can serve one another, organize for justice, widen the circle of concern, collectively imagine new ways forward in community, and grow spiritually."

Article II of the UUA Bylaws houses the principles and sources of Unitarian Universalism. Updating it is a collaborative effort, with many surveys, discussion groups, and three GA discussions held. This year (the second of a three-year cycle), 13 amendments to a proposed revised Article II were voted on; five passed. The Principles and Sources you know aren't just being tweaked or lightly edited – the sections on Values and Covenant, Inspirations, Inclusion, and Freedom of Belief are all-new, while being grounded in familiar language and sentiment. We'll share the latest version and invite comments at a Congregational Conversation in the fall. A Business Resolution requiring UUA's Endowment Fund to divest from fossil fuel companies and issue reparations did not pass. Objections to the resolution focused on the ways in which the divestment was to take place and the linking to reparations – not on the goals themselves. (UUA's Board has since issued a statement reaffirming its commitment to climate justice and finding a way forward on reparations.) A contingent of young adults was particularly disappointed that the resolution did not pass and interrupted the proceedings with banners and chants – an act of civil disobedience not unlike those that Boomers will remember, but that was allowed to play out with patience and compassion.

The delegates at GA voted for three **Actions of Immediate Witness**, social justice resolutions that support:

- ending the planned Cop City in Atlanta
- protecting the rights of DACA Dreamers
- health equity

Worship Services We Attended

At the Synergy Bridging Worship, youth are honored as they cross the bridge into young adult-hood.

At the **Service of the Living Tradition**: Toward Our Metamorphosis into Who Knows What, we honored ministers and UU leaders who have died, recognized those who completed professional service (including our own Rev. Jan Taddeo!), and welcomed newly fellowshipped, credentialed ministers.

At Deeper than The Skin, we heard a musical presentation on Race in America. Two friends...one Black, one White...born three days apart into completely different narratives, used the power of story and song to move us from emotion to action.

GNUUs Glossary

UUs enjoy our abbreviations and jargon in a way that could be unwelcoming to those outside of our congregation. Here's a brief glossary of some commonly used terms and abbreviations.

Blue Christmas: service acknowledging how difficult the winter holidays can be for some **Bridging**: ceremony acknowledging when someone has graduated in some aspect of their lives. From the age group of under 5 to the 5-7 age group, to the 8-12 age group, to teens, to adulthood, as well as any milestones in an individual's life

Child Dedications: dedicating the education of a child to the congregation. A ritual similar to baptism

Covenant: agreement that all parties have agreed to **CUUPs**: Covenant of Unitarian Universalists Pagans

GNUUs: Gwinnett news for Unitarian Universalists (monthly newsletter)

Luminescence: UU holiday celebrating all aspects of light

Nine Waves Blessing: Druid based ritual that is used in many other rituals

Singing the Journey: the paperback, newer teal hymnal

Singing the Living Tradition: the hardback, older grey hymnal **Spirit Stones**: ritual honoring those lost in mass shootings

Sylvan Sanctuary: Our Druid grove that hosts 8 public rituals per year.

UU: Unitarian Universalist

UUA: Unitarian Universalist Association (national organization of UU congregations)

UUCG: Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett (our congregation)

Fox(y) News

Perhaps you have already seen the fox family that has established a home on our UUCG property. They will be with us for a little while longer, until the kits are able to live on their own.

Here is some info and advice from the Georgia Department of Natural Resources about living with foxes:

"Valued as one of the classic representatives of the wild canid family, foxes are found throughout the state in both rural and urban landscapes. In Georgia, there are two species of fox - the gray fox (Urocyon cinereoargenteus) and the red fox (Vulpes vulpes). The Gray is grizzled gray in color with patches of reddish fur on the neck, flanks, legs and underside of the tail, gray foxes weigh between 8-12 pounds, are 34-40 inches in total length. A black stripe runs along their back down to the tail tip. Sexual maturity occurs at approximately one year of age and the mating season runs from January through April. Following a 53-day gestation period, females give birth to 2-7 pups. Considered monogamous, both male and female gray foxes work together to raise pups until the pups become independent after about 3 months of age. Because of the adaptability of both gray and red foxes to urban and suburban environments, as well as the abundant food and shelter associated with these areas, foxes are quite common in cities, towns, subdivisions, and even near rural home sites as well as in their natural habitat. Although foxes are primarily nocturnal hunters, it is not uncommon to see a fox during the day. If you see a fox during the day in either the woods or in your vard, the best advice is to simply leave it alone. You may want to remove any bird feeders that may be attracting mice and birds to your yard, which in turn attracts foxes. Other prey items for foxes include domestic fowl like chickens, guineas, and ducks. To alleviate domestic depredation issues, building exclusionary pens is the best solution. Both red and gray foxes can carry diseases and parasites such as rabies, distemper, roundworms, fleas, and mange mites."

Let's be good neighbors and be patient: leave them alone, while at the same time appreciating this closeness to one of Nature's wild creatures.

Combating Fascism

I recently attended a webinar with prework on the issue of combatting fascism. It was both erudite and inspirational. The prework was to listen to the 2023 Berry Street Essay by the Rev. Cecilia Kingman ("The Berry Street Essay was established by Rev. William Ellery Channing in 1820 for the Ministerial Conference in Berry Street. It is thought to be the longest-running lecture series in the United States and is now traditionally offered at the conclusion of the Unitarian Universalist Ministers Association's Ministry Days conference, which coincides with the General Assembly.") This essay was entitled "My Little Pony was right: Reflections on Fascisms Without and Within".

I then attended the first of two webinar sessions on July 17th (<u>the second webinar</u> is still open for registration – the second webinar is on the concrete actions we can take to combat fascism). My biggest learning for myself is how I tend to "obey in advance"; I consider all the risks before acting. This may be a trauma response and is something I need to explore more in myself. This is the kind of stuff that happens in a Side with Love Webinar.
