Rediscovering the Joy of the Journey

"Oh, I love your necklace!" I hear whenever I'm wearing one of my rainbow-colored chalice pendants.

"Thanks so much! It's the symbol of

my religion, Unitarian Universalism!" I never pass up a chance to tell more people about us.

"Uni-what?" is almost always the reply.

"Unitarian Universalism," I say again with a laugh. "I know, it's a lot of syllables!" And then I launch into an enthusiastic version of my "elevator speech," the shortest, clearest description I can come up with for our beautiful, complicated faith:

"We believe that every person and everything is born with beauty and worthy of respect, and that we're all connected, so what we do matters. This means we're called to work for justice for everyone, and for the earth and all its creatures. And it means we can have people of all races, genders, sexual orientations, abilities, and beliefs in the sanctuary on a Sunday morning."

For years now, I've used this link between Unitarian Universalism's First Principle (the inherent worth and dignity of all) and the Seventh (the interconnected web) to name why justice work is the logical and inevitable result of our two core beliefs.

Lately, though, I've begun to wonder if this logical connection is really enough to keep us going on the journey to creating all-inclusive Beloved Community. There's just so much pain and suffering in our lives and in our world, whether we're feeling it directly or

indirectly. All different kinds of trauma—generational, familial, societal—have been exacerbated by the pandemic, by fear-driven polarization, by hate speech, acts of violence, and war.

It's dis-heartening, to say the least; it can crumple our hearts, bodies, and spirits. The motivation of the mind—"I know this is what I should do"—simply can't cut through our disillusionment and our despair.

So this month, as we look at "The Gifts of Justice and Equity," I want to return to the "Liberating Love" (January's theme) that's at the core of who we are and why we're called to this work. Let's remember what justice and equity feel like in our relationships, in our encounters large and small. Let's reconnect with "The Joy of the Journey" (the first title that Karin Lin and I tried on for our book Mistakes and Miracles). Let's savor the beauty in the people we meet and relish the expansiveness of what we learn when we join in helping to heal the world. Let's look for the gifts in the work itself and rediscover how it makes us feel alive!

Message from the Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that in December two new AC units were installed at UUCG. The previous units served us well for a very long time, but one had finally given out and the other was close behind. In November, the congregation voted to move forward with the work, and the exact language of that adopted proposal was:

"The Board of Trustees of UUCG proposes to take out a loan from the UUCG Endowment Fund for \$20,000.00 in fiscal year 2023 as a means of funding the replacement of two of the three HVAC systems, including the replacement of two gas furnaces with heat pumps."

The language was very specific, as the intention was to have this important and necessary task align with our core values: to make our sanctuary a green space. We are so grateful for the congregation's support, and we are proud of our bold community.

However, as often happens with even the best laid plans, we had some complications.

The electrician who was preparing the electrical boxes for the HVAC work informed us that UUCG does not have enough power to the building to support the full heat pump systems. We have 400 Amps into the building. Between the 120A water heater, the kitchen appliances, etc., the new systems would overload the power supply. Apparently, this a common conundrum: the heat pumps require a lot of amperage, especially with the heat strips that are needed for those "extreme" cold days. To install and fully utilize the heat pumps, UUCG needed to have additional electrical work done, which was not budgeted.

We had other conditions to consider, as well, such as the current nonfunctioning AC being required to be replaced per the contract with our rentals; and we had few opportunities where the building is essentially empty to have work done. This left us with a few options:

Move the project forward using high efficiency furnaces, which would have less environmental impact than the current furnaces, but it would commit UUCG to gas furnaces for at least another 20 years.

Only replace the AC units with comparable AC units, and deal with the heating issues when the furnaces require replacement.

Replace the AC units with the "heat pump" units as AC only. Then, when the congregation is ready to upgrade the electrical system, we would be positioned to transition to the full heat pumps and remove gas furnaces.

In keeping with the intent of the adopted proposal, we chose Option #3. Should UUCG transition away from gas furnaces later, it will not require replacement of the newer AC units. We felt this option gave the congregation the most flexibility to accomplish UUCG's long-term goals of reduction of CO2 emissions, and met the short term needs of sufficient heating/cooling within the given budget.

Notably, the project did come in under budget! The remaining funds will be held in reserve while we explore the cost of additional electrical work.

We thank everyone who has worked with us on this project. In particular, we acknowledge the contributions of Doug Beers and the UUCG Endowment Fund; Terry Welsher and Georgia Interfaith Power & Light; Christiana McQuain and the UUCG staff; and especially congregant Ian Van Sice, whose expert advice guided us in the process, including the selection of the best vendor to complete this work.



Why Serve on the UUCG Board?

Every committee and team at UUCG is in recruiting mode these days. We're each asked to give of our time, talent, or treasure. We need your help to run our cherished faith community and its programs. Do what you're comfortable with! Maybe you want to start small – join the Hospitality Committee. Have a passion for our environment? Join the Green Team. The opportunities are numerous.

If you've been on a committee or two, been a UU for a few years, and been a member of UUCG for at least one year, perhaps you're ready to step up, to give more. Consider serving on our Board of Trustees. The Board is vested with the care and administration of UUCG and its business affairs. It meets monthly, often via Zoom, with the amount of work and study between meetings varying from year to year.

I served on the Board for two years. I found it both gratifying and challenging. I grew; I stretched. I learned more about the governance of UUCG and its relationship with the UUA. I learned about the structure of nonprofit corporations, expanded my leadership skills, and improved my ability to listen mindfully and compassionately.

My experience is in line with that of others. According to GrowthForce.com, aside from developing leadership skills, nonprofit board members increase their emotional intelligence, becoming better listeners, more empathic, and more appreciative of different experiences. GrowthForce also says that, by serving on a nonprofit board, "you can gain or improve your ability to make decisions, think critically, and solve problems as a part of a greater ability to plan strategically for future success." These skills can serve your career and your personal relationships.

I'm proud of what the Board accomplished during the two years I served. You, too, can feel that sense of pride in a job well done!

Board Positions

Initially, Board members are elected as at-large members. After serving and observing for a few months, you volunteer for a specific position: Treasurer-elect, Secretary-elect, or President -elect-elect. You serve in "elect" mode for a year, then step into the primary role. What other role can you think of where you have an entire year to learn the job? You're needed as a Secretary if you have word processing skills, or as the Treasurer if you have basic Excel skills. Nothing advanced! You can improve as you go. (The Presidentelect-elect serves a year before becoming Presidentelect.) At the start of the program year (July), the Board holds a weekend retreat. If the thought of joining our Board appeals to you, reach out to Peggy Averyt, **Nominating Committee** Chair, for more information, this month. The Committee determines the nominees.

2024 Notes from the Green Team

Our Brainstorming Breakfast on January 6 was a morning of fellowship and ideas. Xoey Kelly reviewed what we had accomplished the past year:

- one session of the Web of Life curriculum
- a screening of The Biggest Little Farm
- replanting the labyrinth with native plants
- helping to replace the AC units in the building with heat pump

We then moved to **ideas for 2024**; waste and the waste stream were recurring topics. Hannah Schultz from <u>Georgia Interfaith Power and Light (GIPL)</u> was our consultant for the morning, and she suggested that we take a **tour of the West Rock Recycling Center** in Marietta to see what happened to the things we throw away. Waste will also be a focus of the **Web of Life curriculum** presented this year. There may even be a **trip to Scraplanta** to deliver and pick up art supplies that are no longer needed. And because we had an instance of dumping in the back of our parking lot that required hazardous waste removal, the topic of cameras and signage came up once again.

The specifics of cleaning up along one mile of Bethesda Church Road were discussed with the idea that we take part in **Gwinnett Clean and Beautiful's Adopt-A-road program**. After they approve our choice of road, we need to schedule four clean-up sessions per year. They will provide bags, trash pickers, and safety vests for us and let the count know that trash bags are ready to be disposed of.

GIPL offers a **legislative letter writing campaign to save the Okefenokee Swamp from mining activity** as presented in Georgia House Bill 71. Hannah also suggested that we screen Sacred Waters, a film about the unique importance of the Okefenokee Swamp. And although HB 71 did not get to a vote last year, it could come up again in 2024. Be sure to find out who your local state representatives are!

"Republican Rep. Darlene Taylor of Thomasville has persuaded a bipartisan group of 90 fellow lawyers to co-sponsor House Bill 71, which would prohibit the state from granting mining permits along Trail Ridge on the swamp's eastern boundary.

Whether Twin Pines will be allowed to mine on 773 acres (312 hectares) is completely up to Georgia state officials, as the federal government relinquished any permitting authority over the Twin Pines project following a rollback of environmental regulations under President Donald Trump."

And our <u>UUA Action of Immediate Witness concerning the Police Training Center in Atlanta</u> (Stop Cop City), and their lack of environmental impact statement, was on the table as well. More letter writing and other activities as needed.

Bruce Leonard, a newer church member, presented an original artwork, Butterfly Effect as a visualization of spiritual connection to greenspace work peace. <u>International Peace Day is September 21, 2024</u>. Bruce strongly feels that a community event is needed.

Imbolc Ritual


February 3rd at 6:00pm

Imbolc is said to be from an old Irish word that means "in the belly," referring to the pregnant ewes who were about to give birth to their lambs. During this time we celebrate the turning of Winter to Spring. In addition, this is also the time to honor Brigid, the goddess of fire, the sun, the hearth, smithcraft, healing, poetry and fertility among many other things.

The Sylvan Sanctuary Druids' Imbolc Ritual involves a bit of preparation. We bless our Brigid's Mantles the night before the ritual by leaving them out to collect the dew of the morning. This is called a Brat Bhríde, it is then blessed at the ritual by many hands and worn for personal protection and health throughout the year. Please join us for ritual and pot luck afterwards. Trial by Richard North Patterson


Meeting Wednesday, February 28 at 7pm

Interfaith Prayer for Peace

On December 17, 2023, I represented UUCG at an Interfaith Prayer Event sponsored by the Gwinnett Interfaith Alliance (gwinnettinterfaithalliance.org). This event, held at Temple Beth David in Snellville, had Christian, Jewish, Muslim, Sikh, and UU faith leaders leading prayers for peace. I share with you the remarks and prayer I presented. I also am sharing pictures from the event which also offered an opportunity for connection and fellowship.



"Hello, I am Barbara Stahnke, Lay Minister of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett. I come here today in support of calls for Peace and Care. Peace and care for all of our siblings on the planet and specifically for the peoples of Israel and Palestine. Christians, Jews, and Muslims, people of all faiths. My faith tradition, Unitarian Universalism (UU), calls for respect and understanding of everyone's spiritual path. Today, I bring that call for respect and understanding to this prayer for peace.

The Unitarian Universalist faith tradition is congregational in nature and each congregation reflects the local interpretation of spiritual growth and knowledge.

The Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Gwinnett is guided by national, democratically selected principles that we agree to support and live out in our daily lives. These principles include Generosity, Interdependence, Justice, Pluralism, Transformation, Equity, and our core principle of Love. This time in our world calls for all these principles to be lived out in our lives with each other, our interactions with the wider world, and our interactions with our inner hearts, minds, and spirits.

In my role as Lay Minister, I am trusted by my congregation to Connect to the Wider World. This event, an Interfaith Gathering around Peace, is something most in my congregation support. I say "most" because, as in all human interaction, some might distrust and distort this important peace-building work. Peace begins with each human interaction because of our interdependence



with the earth, each other, and ourselves. Why do I support and show up for this event? Many others are not here. My Generous heart knows that they might not have heard of the event and would be here if they knew. My Equity Heart knows that the time demands are not equal for everyone during this time of year. My Interdependent heart knows that some believe that there is only one right way, and this is not it. My Justice-seeking heart knows that sharing power moves us towards peace but that many are caught in the pursuit of power over others. (cont. on next page)



(cont. from previous page) My Pluralist heart knows that honoring and respecting each other is necessary for our Interdependent world. We need each other in all ways and always this is transformational. The teachings of each of our faith traditions support and embrace Love as a core value. We come together with our highest value – Love. We must continue to remember to love ourselves; Love our family, friends, neighbors, and adversaries. If we cannot love our adversaries at first, we can pray for them. Pray for our and their best self to come forward at each point of decision. Pray for their wellness. Pray for their healing toward peace."

I now lift these words, adapted from a prayer for peace by Rev. Feargus O'Connor

Eternal Spirit, we pray for peace for the people of Palestine, Israel, and wherever in the world war, strife and discord afflict and divide people. We pray for a just peace everywhere, for the fair resolution of all grievances, disputes, and wrongs, and that just ordering of the world which opens the way to true reconciliation and lasting peace.

We pray for all victims of war, those maimed in body and spirit, their families, and all who suffer pain, loss, and sorrow caused by bloodshed and war.

We pray for the United Nations and its agencies, the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies, and all international humanitarian bodies helping to care for people and laying down the foundations for enduring universal peace.

We pray for all peacemakers and bridge builders who act and campaign for international peace. May they never lose heart and be ever mindful of the justice and rightness of their cause.

We pray for each other that we may stay courageous, curious, and compassionate locally. May our support for each other lead to the building of bridges here today that will spread ripples beyond these walls.
