

A Change in Tenants

We have been fortunate that over the last three years we have hosted the Gwinnett franchise of the Turning Sun pre-school. Unfortunately, a few months ago they made the decision to relocate to a different facility, and requested an early termination of their lease. We are sad to see them go, and wish them success at their new location.

Shortly after Turning Sun ceased operations in our building, a potential new tenant stepped forward with an exciting proposal. We are pleased to welcome Friendship Forest Academy, a new school for neurodiverse children, to our facility. Jennifer Hickey, the president and founder of Friendship Forest was familiar with our space already, as her child previously attended Turning Sun at our location. Friendship Forest has a mission, "to provide highquality education to students who need tailored and creative educational approaches that foster their intrinsic love for learning and cultivating lifelong relationships."

At present, there are few resources available in Gwinnett County that provide individualized educational services for students in need of those. Friendship Forest Academy plans to serve a maximum of 12 students with a 2:1 student:teacher ratio, allowing high levels of support for students who need it. They will use two classrooms and create a sensory room in our building, with one of those classrooms being available for our use on the weekend. We are excited to welcome Friendship Forest Academy to our building, and look forward to a long relationship with them.

No Potluck in February

There will be no potluck or shared meals in February due to COVID transmission numbers in Gwinnett County.

The UUCG board determines our COVID precautions based on 3 weeks of data from COVID Act Now, a non-profit that tracks data about COVID infections and hospitalizations. If, according to their data, the transmission rate in Gwinnett County has remained Low level, we will resume hosting Potluck Luncheons on first Sundays.

This is, "the annual gathering of Unitarian Universalists, where we conduct business of the Association, explore the theological underpinnings of our faith, and lean fully into our mission and principles." Ministry: Radical Welcome

Wider, Higher, and Smoother

Dear Friends,

I am excited to be working with the Shared Ministry Council in the area of Radical Welcome. Radical Welcome is about drawing the circle wider, raising the bar higher, and making the threshold smoother! And, I have a lot to learn about all of the ways we can do this together!



I will work with our ministry teams to develop plans and register volunteers in all task areas. Here is an overview:

- •Our outside and inside **greeters** are our "first chances" at making sure folks are well taken care of as they go to Worship, Faith Development, or the Nursery/ Childcare.
- •Hospitality helps with our post-Service "Call to Connection," as well as potlucks and other events where we serve food and (nonalcoholic) beverages. The Congregation's job is to help them where needed in set-up and clean-up.
- •The "**Sharing the Journey**" program is the Congregation's way to give folks a path to membership and to foster relationships inside our walls. This program, which is registering now and starts soon, invites folks new to UU, as well as members interested in developing connections with our newcomers, to join us.
- •Our **"Good Trouble"** programs on the 4th Sunday, the Green Team, Covenant Groups, and other programs are ways to be "seen and heard" as UUs expressing our values in the community. These activities connect us to a lot of folks who share our values, so they are an important part of Radical Welcome.

We are accountable to each other and the beloved community to honor peoples' individual worth and dignity, to recognize how individuals and groups, including BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color) and people who are LBGTQIA+ have been (and are being) marginalized. We are accountable to bring them (and their voices) into the center of our beloved community, and to release our burdens of regret for past actions. To this end, although our curriculum will change over time, we have a commitment to these programs: •Working on Whiteness

- •Transgender Inclusion in Congregations
- •Welcoming Congregation (yearly renewal)

Part of "smoothing our threshold" is to embrace people with disabilities in our set-ups and planning for events, which takes some work at times to make sure all opportunities to use our facilities are available. We are certified as handicapped- accessible and have a Sanctuary layout reflecting that. We provide assisted-listening devices to those who request them.

In addition to the above areas, I see opportunities (let me know if you are interested) for learning and change in these areas:

- •countering overt, systemic, and implicit disenfranchisement;
- •joining the worldwide movement for peace;
- •further study of healthy communication, conflict resolution, restorative practices, and reconciliation.

Above all, our best Radical Welcome is to emphatically thank folks who let us know how we can do better, "love each other up," encourage each other, consistently practice discernment, offer in-person invitations to become involved, and try to ensure a great experience for everyone who crosses our threshold.

Reskilling

Reading and researching on other canning methods, fermenting recipes, and learning to make my own cider and mead.

Some of them I find I absolutely love, like canning, cooking, gardening and foraging. Others are more challenging for me like sewing, weaving and crocheting. But I press on and still my desire to reskill myself is prominent.

I always had a desire to learn to sew, make my own clothes (clothes are so expensive), create clothes for others, sew dolls and bags and other things to make my house look so amazing.

My step mother sewed, it was so amazing to see her take measurements, cut out the pattern and piece it together to create a dress, shawl, table cloth and dolls. I LOVED everything that she made, but never learned to sew, not that well. I can piece a sideways bag together, but that's about it.

I've deemed that this is the year that I'll learn to sew and I'm excited to be part of the Sewing with Sherree classes!

I love to create things for myself, for friends and family and people in general. To see their faces in awe when they realize it's made specifically for them. It may be selfish on my part to impart such joy on others, possibly an ego boost when I hear the words "WOW, you made this, you're so talented!" But so be it, my love language is creating and giving.

Ministry: Connecting Beyond

30 Days of Love

For the past 11 years, the 30 days of Love Campaign has been facilitated by the Unitarian Universalist Association. The campaign provides resources for Unitarian Universalists (UUs) and other faiths to build awareness about what needs to be changed to end injustice, to develop abilities in making change happen, and to identify ways each of us can take action(s) to live out love in the world.

This annual campaign runs from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day through February fourteenth. This year's focus is on a major justice issue each week; you will find that these issues are all intersectional. When you start with one, you will be impacting injustice in another area. 30 days of Love is not just for UUs; please consider sharing the resources with friends and family who may be interested.

For me, I am taking these 30 Days of Love to reflect on the myriad ways the treatment of all the stages of kidney disease in African Americans is impacted by systemic injustice. An <u>article</u> announcing new guidelines for transplant hospitals requiring the transition to race-neutral calculations of estimated Glomerular Filtration Rate (eGFR) hit my desk the same week the 30 Days of Love Campaign started.

Not to get too technical, eGFR is used to determine treatment decisions for kidney disease. The lower the eGFR, the more severe the kidney disease. These levels determine the level of treatment. For years – approximately 1999 - 2012 - almost all eGFR calculations used a race factor – and this was based on science (people who self-identified as African American had a higher average Creatinine level). This led to a higher eGFR. Remember, the lower the eGFR the more severe the disease. Transplant waiting time is partially based on eGFR. Typically, one can apply for the waiting list when eGFR is around 20.

The problem is race is not a biological construct (which we have known for years – human genome project anyone?). And the fact is African Americans have an almost four times higher incidence of kidney disease. Around 2020 (date suggest anything to you?), scientists got hard to work; by 2021 the National Kidney Foundation and the American Society of Nephrologists came up with new calculations without a race factor that all member labs are required to transition to. The new policy for transplant hospitals requires them to adjust patients waiting time if the eGFR initially used had a race factor.

I tell you this story because I believe it took all of us standing up, speaking out, and demanding justice for years prior to 2020; the louder actions with more voices in 2020 amped up the processes. Our actions on the side of love; making sure we live out the verb version of love, are making a difference in the lives of our African American Siblings. Look for the changes happening – I think you will find them – then take some joy in making a difference.


