

This organization collects unused food from grocery stores and restaurants and redistributes it to those in need. Not only does it help feed hungry people, Second Helpings discourages food waste, benefiting the environment too.

In 2023, Second Helpings' food rescue network diverted over 5.8 million pounds of surplus food from landfills, providing the equivalent of 4.8 million fresh, nutritious meals. A second program, Full Plate Project, provided 400,000 complete meals, donated by Hello Fresh, restaurants and caterers, to partner agencies throughout metro Atlanta.

Second Helpings began in 2004 at Temple Sinai in Atlanta. After continued growth, it became an independent nonprofit in 2012. Currently, the organization serves a 10-county metro Atlanta area. Learn more at secondhelpingsatlanta.org

Growing Through the Practice of Inclusion: We Are Made for This!

One afternoon psychologist Robert Kegan is watching his daughter learn to read. "I watch her listening intently to her own announcement of each letter's sound," he writes. "'Sih-aeh-nih-duh,' she says, peering over these symbols, sitting still among these sounds which do not yet cohere for her. 'Saan-duh.' It is still an alien sound the way she says it, something strange and apart from her. She waits, strenuously. 'Sand!' she says, arriving home."


What a life-changing event it is whenever we learn a new word! Once Kegan's daughter knows that S, A, N, and D mean "sand," then every time she reads that word, she will connect it with her own experience of sand in her bathing suit, sand between her toes, sand on snowy roads. The word now has meaning for her—and she can make meaning with it. Her world—and she herself—grow bigger and more complex because of this new word.

It's a metaphor but it's also literally true: Living our Love through the practice of inclusion is like constantly sounding out new words. To become more inclusive, we have to sit still among the new "sounds"—new words, situations, people. This newness doesn't yet fit into our previous understandings or experience. We have to wait strenuously for our minds and hearts to stretch and make room. Finally, when the new understanding begins to make sense, it feels like coming home to a bigger and more complex world. Often it's more difficult, too. Still, both we and the world become so much more alive and interesting and full of possibilities!

Can you think of one of your early prejudices that finally began to bump up against new experiences? These new experiences made you question that preconception, made you wonder whether your

understanding was really big enough.

Some of us remember when writers and speakers began to use "he or she" instead of



But did "everyone" know that? Or rather, did everyone feel included in "he"?

Slowly, more and more people began to hear these words in new ways. They began to recognize the power of language to include or exclude. The pronouns were a symbol, but an important one. Some of the people who had resisted the change also cared about the people who felt left out. So, out of love, they gradually grew.

We humans don't always choose to make such changes. We don't always get the support we need to understand the need for them.

But here at UUCG, let us support each other as we come upon each new word in this ever-expanding practice of inclusion. Let's open ourselves to change because it feels wonderful to love, and to be loved, and to grow together.

# "To Repair the World, What Is Mine to Do?" Revisiting UUCG's Responses

# **UUCG** is Hiring

As we move into 2025, the Congregation will have two positions open.

• The **Office Administrator** handles formatting and distribution of all UUCG publications (including the weekly eNews, monthly GNUUs newsletter, Orders of Service for Worship, and Call to Connection announcement slides), sorts mail, replies to phone messages, and orders supplies. This position requires good communication skills, and understanding of UU Values, and proficiency with the Microsoft Office Suite of programs as well as experience with Google Drive.

This job requires some flexibility of hours & days, including some Sundays, and on-site work time is also required. This is a 15-hour per week position.

• The **Facilities Caretaker** will posses the skills to perform light groundskeeping, minimal building maintenance, moving of furniture (folding tables and our upholstered chairs), and cleaning of the building twice weekly on Friday and Sunday nights. This is a 10-hour per week position.

Full job descriptions for both positions will be available by the end of February when the positions are ready to be officially posted.

# From the Board

# Safety And Security by Dan Kelly, President UUCG Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees and Reverend Nancy had the great honor of recognizing the work of UUCG's Safety and Security Committee during the January 12th worship service, lifting up the important work that they do each and every week to keep our sanctuary safe and welcoming. On behalf of the congregation, we continue to offer our gratitude for this important work.

Subsequently, the Safety and Security Committee met with the Board during the January 19th Board Meeting to discuss how to serve our community safely and faithfully.



Together, we are planning a Safety Drill. Specifically, at the Committee's suggestion, the Board is instituting a new policy that requires two drills each calendar year. The types of drills that may be practiced include Fire Drills, Tornado or Severe Weather Drills, Medical Emergency Drills and Active Shooter Drills. We held a Fire Drill in the Fall during which we evacuated the building, with great success, and we are now planning an Active Shooter Drill for the Spring. Similar to the Fire Drill, we will discuss the procedures and expectations before performing the drill. Those with sensitivities to such events will have an opportunity to receive the information without participating in the drill itself.

The Committee will continue to discuss best practices with specialists, local law enforcement, and UUA resources. We encourage all congregants to familiarize themselves with the ALICE protocols

recommended by UUA. The Committee and the Board also discussed a responsible Gun Policy that meets the needs of our congregation while leaning into the values of our faith community. The official policy that the Board has adopted is:

UUCG Policy regarding Guns on Campus adheres to <u>Georgia State Law (O.C.G.A. § 16-11-127)</u>. This statute prohibits firearms "in a place of worship" unless permissions granted by "the governing body or authority of the place of worship." Under Georgia State Law, permission may not be given selectively to individuals.

The Board reserves the exclusive right, and only by unanimous vote, to grant such permission. At this time, permission has not been granted.

For the purposes of this policy, "place of worship" refers to all UUCG grounds, including outdoor spaces. A lawful weapons carrier is permitted to have a firearm securely locked in their vehicle while on UUCG property.

The UUCG Board of Trustees recognizes the challenges of any policy that affects the safety and security of individuals and the congregation. We thank you for your support in implementing policies and procedures that serve all of our community.


This workshop is a very important one especially

# Positively Green

Wintertime is here,
But Spring is drawing near.
My mailman brings me catalogs
Full of seeds and gardening gear!
(Apologies to Vince Guaraldi. And Charlie Brown)

As odd as it may seem, Winter is the time to plan your garden for Spring. Whether it is a vegetable garden full of annuals or a pollinator garden full of native plants, now is the time to decide what you would like to plant and where to put it. The UUCG Green Team would like to encourage you to include some milkweed in your garden for monarch butterflies and others.

The monarch butterfly, Danaus plexippus, was put on the federal list of endangered species as a threatened species in 2024. Their numbers have been declining for years for a variety of reasons, principal among them is loss of habitat. Creating more habitats for these butterflies is something we can all do whether in the ground or in flowerpots.

Monarchs Across Georgia is a non-profit group dedicated to educating folks about the ways of the monarch butterfly. It recommends four species of milkweed to host the butterfly larva; it is the these leaves that matter to the caterpillars. Milkweeds are in the genus Asclepias, and all have a milky sap that is toxic to caterpillar predators. Be sure to handle all the plants with gloves and wash thoroughly when finished. Protect any little helpers you may have as well:

- Asclepias verticillata—Whorled milkweed.
   Small white flowers in sun.
- Asclepias tuberosa—Butterfly weed. Bright orange flowers, sandy soil.
- Asclepias incarnata—Swamp milkweed. Pink flowers in a wet spot. Sun.
- Asclepias perennis—Red-ring, or White, milkweed. Shade tolerant.

Seeds of these plants are commercially available. The plants themselves will be available as Spring arrives from nurseries. Or the garden of a friend. Keep in mind that while the caterpillars eat the leaves to grow, the adult butterflies will need nectar to feed. Monarch Watch recommends planting 6-8 nectar plants for every milkweed host plant. (Yay! More plants!)

The Georgia Native Plant Societies has a list of nurseries where milkweed is available. It will also list the dates of the spring plant sales held by its local chapters.



# Embracing your Inner Light Materials: A small mirror Ritual: R


- · A small mirror
- A pink candle (for self-love and compassion)
- Rose petals or a small handful of dried lavender (for calming and nurturing energy)
- A small bowl of water (for cleansing)
- Your favorite crystal (rose quartz is ideal, but any crystal that feels special to you works)
- A journal and pen



### **Preparation:**

- 1. Find a quiet space where you won't be disturbed.
- 2. Cleanse the space with a ritual you enjoy (e.g., lighting incense or sprinkling salt water).

- 1. Set Your Space: Place the mirror in front of you, with the candle in the center and the bowl of water and crystal nearby. Scatter the rose petals or lavender around the candle to create a circle of loving energy.
- 2. Light the Candle: As you light the pink candle, say: "I call upon the flame of love and compassion to guide me. Let this light shine within me, warming my heart and filling me with kindness for myself."
- 3. Hold the Crystal: Pick up your crystal, close your eyes, and take three deep breaths. Imagine the crystal radiating gentle energy, filling you with love and strength.
- 4. Mirror Affirmations: Look into the mirror. Hold your gaze and say these words aloud or in your heart: "I see myself as I truly am. I am worthy, I am enough, I am love." Repeat three times, or as many times as you feel called.
- 5. Water Blessing: Dip your fingers into the bowl of water and gently touch your forehead, heart, and wrists, saying: "I cleanse away doubt, fear, and pain. I welcome love, peace, and strength into my being."
- 6. Journal Reflection: Write in your journal about what you love about yourself and what you want to nurture in your life. Let the candle burn safely while you write.
- 7. Close the Spell: When ready, thank the energy you've summoned: "I honor the love within me. May it grow brighter with each passing day. So it is." Blow out the candle and carry the crystal with you as a reminder of your self-love.

Here at UUCG we strive to embody this practice by fostering initiatives that confront inequities, build bridges, and create a world where everyone can thrive.

On the cusp of this new administration and its harmful agenda, our work becomes even more urgent. Policies that threaten marginalized communities demand a bold response grounded in love and justice.
