# The Power of Story and the New Story That Is Ours to Tell by Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones (she/her)

From as early as I can remember, I have loved stories, whether they arrive in books or movies, on TV or in the stories told by a friend or stranger. I am so lucky that all my life's vocations—actor, editor, minister, writer—have focused on the power of story.

Stories have changed the way I understand the world and myself. Stories have taught me new pathways in life. Stories have helped me to understand what it means to be human and alive and have helped me figure out which path I want to take.

At the same time, learning how some stories throughout history get privileged while others are minimized or silenced, and then seeking out the stories I haven't yet heard—this has made my life more broken-openhearted, more compassionate and humble, and infinitely richer and more real.

And then, here comes our faith, Unitarian Universalism, which shows us that we can tell a new and liberating story even when society's dominant stories try to limit us. For instance, in the 18th and 19th centuries, when the dominant Protestant story about human beings was that we were "predestined" for heaven or hell no matter what, our religious ancestors told a new story: We humans have more choice than that, they said. We can choose to do good, to do ill, or to be indifferent, in this world. These choices make a difference in whether we create heaven or hell right here on earth—and that matters for all of us, no exceptions!

Hooray for being all bound up together in this complicated project called Life! Hallelujah for the capacity to shape new stories that change our own lives and the world around us!



So as we launch this new year, I wonder: What new stories of possibility, of choice, of connection and commitment are ours to tell? If the dominant story is that there's not enough to go around, and that some people get the resources to survive and thrive while others don't, then how can we, right here at UUCG, not just tell but live a story of practical abundance, of encouragement and care for all we touch?

I can't wait to write this story together! Happy New Year, beloveds!

## Where Can We Learn More About Story?


This month I want to share some classic resources—meaning they didn't come out just this past year! These books, podcasts, and speeches have changed the way I think about Living Love Through the Practice of Story, our theme this month.

• If you were to watch, read, or listen to just one resource on our theme this month, I recommend author Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie's 2018 TED Talk, "The Danger of a Single Story." You can find the video below and you can read the pdf <a href="here">here</a>:



publishing house, Beacon Press, there are now many books that tell the story of this country from the perspective of groups that have been (and often still are) oppressed. A Disability History of the United States by Kim E. Nielsen (2013) and An Indigenous Peoples' History of the United States by Roxanne Dunbar-Ortiz (2015, and the UUA Common Read 2019-20), A Black Women's History of the United States by Diana Ramey Berry and Kali Nicole Gross (2020) are just three examples. I confess, I haven't read all of these, but the one I loved listening to and highly recommend is A Queer History of the United States by Michael Bronski (2012-always check for more recent editions!). This book gives one of the best explanations of how, when, and why people's stories are recorded, lost, and refound —an explanation that applies not just to queer history. With LGBTQIA+ rights seriously at stake once more, you'll find this book inspiring and instructive about how to live a liberating story even in the face of major obstacles.

Way back in 1980,

## **UUCG** will Soon Be Hiring

As we move into 2025, the Congregation will have two positions open.

• The **Office Administrator** handles formatting and distribution of all UUCG publications (including the weekly eNews, monthly GNUUs newsletter, Orders of Service for Worship, and Call to Connection announcement slides), sorts mail, replies to phone messages, and orders supplies. This position requires good communication skills, and understanding of UU Values, and proficiency with the Microsoft Office Suite of programs as well as experience with Google Drive.

This job requires some flexibility of hours & days, including some Sundays, and on-site work time is also required. This is a 15-hour per week position.

• The **Facilities Caretaker** will posses the skills to perform light groundskeeping, minimal building maintenance, moving of furniture (folding tables and our upholstered chairs), and cleaning of the building twice weekly on Friday and Sunday nights. This is a 10-hour per week position.

Full job descriptions for both positions will be available by the end of January when the positions are ready to be officially posted.

## From the Board

Therefore, as we move into 2025, the Board of Trustees is excited to share this Confusion with you!

On December 15th, by Congregational Vote, UUCG approved its Fiscal Year 2025 Annual Budget, and the accompanying Resolution to monetize a partial buyout of the cell tower lease to repair the building's roof and pay off all current debt service. Remaining funds from the sale will be placed in a Capital Expense Reserve Fund. Stay tuned for more information as we go through the process, including the dates for the repair work. We anticipate that the building will be closed during the repairs, and we will need assistance to prepare the building for the work.

Additionally, by Congregational vote, UUCG has conferred the title of Minister Emerita to Reverend Jan Taddeo. This is a tremendous honor for both Reverend Jan and for the Congregation. With Reverend Jan's permission, we are sharing the beautiful moment in which she was notified, as captured in a Zoom video.


In January, we will take a break from our monthly Congregational Conversations. However, we plan to return in February, March and April as we explore the Open Questions that will guide our future planning:

## The Give Away the Plate recipient for the first quarter of 2025 will be Second Helpings Atlanta.

This organization collects unused food from grocery stores and restaurants and redistributes it to those in need. Not only does it help feed hungry people, Second Helpings discourages food waste, benefiting the environment too.

In 2023, Second Helpings' food rescue network diverted over 5.8 million pounds of surplus food from landfills, providing the equivalent of 4.8 million fresh, nutritious meals. A second program, Full Plate Project, provided 400,000 complete meals, donated by Hello Fresh, restaurants and caterers, to partner agencies throughout metro Atlanta.

Second Helpings began in 2004 at Temple Sinai in Atlanta. After continued growth, it became an independent nonprofit in 2012. Currently, the organization serves a 10-county metro Atlanta area. Learn more at secondhelpingsatlanta.org







Fast forward to today - Nancy has jumped back into the congregation and is participating in our various activities like Covenant Groups and Tarot Programs. It was at Tarot that she met Kim Pfeffer, a newer member of the congregation.


At one of the initial meetings of this fall's second-Saturday Tarot class, not one moment of Tarot took place. For no reason in particular, on that day, the group of women gathered were simply speaking from their hearts and their minds. It was then that Nancy and Kim realized that this was an unmet need at UUCG.

We have a Men's Group and realized that Women needed a dedicated space as well. As women, we have so many things going on in our lives, and the greater world, that we are left feeling disconnected. So often when we are asked how we are, we respond with fine, okay, or good . . . but *are* we? This group will give us an opportunity to come together for a dedicated time, in a safe space, to share, connect and develop deeper connections.

When we meet we will pass the heart stone - a tangible reminder to stay centered, tell our story, and then pass along to another member of the group so that everyone feels heard and connected.

The first meeting of **The Open Circle**, following service on Sunday, January 12, 2025, will allow us to further outline plans for the group and the potential to grow our connections with outings and off-site activities. Regular meetings will be held on the fourth Sunday of each month, following the Service, beginning Sunday, February 23, 2025.

Rhonda's Story

Rhonda was a force of nature, a woman who poured her heart into everything she touched. Life wasn't easy—she bore the scars of three abusive husbands and the weight of raising two daughters with little money. But Rhonda never let hardship define her. Instead, she turned her energy outward, weaving a life of love, service, and connection to her community.


In 1988, while juggling work and motherhood, she became a whirlwind of civic action. Her front yard transformed into a bustling hub of democracy, with a massive bulletin board supporting the Dukakis campaign towering above the grass and giant oak and ash trees around it. Neighbors gathered, to rally or wave signs along the major highway in front of the driveway. It was an unforgettable moment in her children's lives.

Rhonda's passion extended far beyond politics. She was a cornerstone of the local theater group, where she wasn't just an actress but a hostess who baked treats for intermissions and threw unforgettable parties. At Christmastime, she helped create costumes for the kids choir, though her young children were not always thrilled to participate, as the costumes were often satirical, such as the elves' "Bell Bottoms," which consisted of a picture of bells glued to the bottoms of their pants.

A favorite memory of her youngest daughter is the Annual World Champion Hopkins County Stew Contest. While her children explored the festival's 150 cast-iron kettles, Rhonda tended the fire, stirred the huge pot of stew that she made, alongside her boss. Her company would donate any proceeds to this event to children in need in the community. She put her love in every ingredient. Although they never won, it was amazing just to be involved and for her daughters to witness this triumph act of service.

Now, as an adult I see Rhonda's story - my mom's story - as a compass guiding my own life. I honor her by living love through service—

volunteering, helping with Congregation and community events, and showing others the same resilience and generosity she modeled for us. Mom's life taught me that no matter how little we have, there is always something to give. Her story reminds me daily that love is a practice, and in telling her story, I become part of the love she gave to the world.
