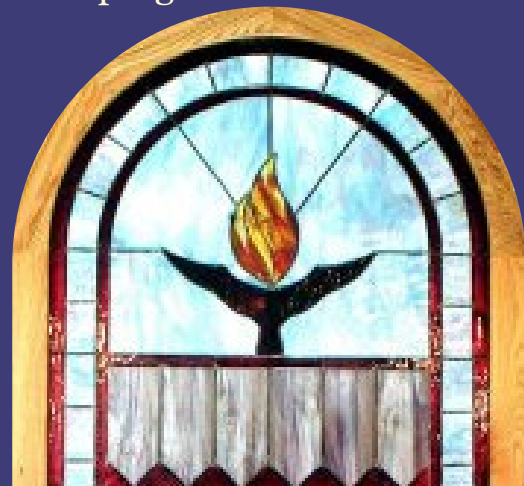

A Starting Point for the Practice of Repair

Now we move from a month of “Living Love Through the Practice of Deep Listening” into a month of “Living Love Through the Practice of Repair.” I wonder: Who (or whom) are we listening to now?

Are we finding the teachers who offer us deeply rooted values and practices that can help us repair the trust, hope, and vision that have been trampled in the stampede to these elections?

My attitude toward the uncertainties of these times—uncertainties that extend well beyond the outcomes of these national and local elections—has shifted as I have become much more intentional about which teachers I’m choosing. I’m looking for teachers who show me how to live my values with ever greater strength and authenticity. Which values? Unitarian Universalism’s call to justice, equity, transformation, pluralism, interdependence, and generosity, all fueled by Love—and my related commitments to compassion, connection, learning, humility, and aliveness.

The teachers who meet these criteria are daily repairing my energy and spirit, and resetting my course. For instance;

Heather Cox Richardson’s “Letters from an American” places current politics in the context of this country’s history. This larger view makes clear how the power-over of a few rips society apart and how the ever-present resilience and creativity of the many help to build an even stronger community.

The podcast “Pod Save the People” looks at news, culture, social justice, and politics, focusing especially on the overlooked stories that most impact people of color. The activists, educators, and cultural observers on the panel show the connections I might miss, and they never leave us listeners stuck in grief, anger, or despair. Sikh author-activist-speaker Valarie Kaur reminds me that Revolutionary Love gives birth to a world where we daily live the truth that we are all connected and where we greet even our opponents with curiosity, courage, and compassion. We rage, we grieve, we listen, we wonder, we fight, and we reimagine—and through it all, like the labor of childbirth, we remember to “Breathe! And then? Push!”

My teachers are showing me the way to repair my broken heart and to help to heal the world. What are your teachers showing you? Come share what you are learning with us!

Message From the Lay Minister for Radical Welcome

When you think of inviting a person over to your house, what is your ritual to invite them over for dinner? Sharing a meal together is a great way of sharing time with your loved ones. From shared family recipes to captivating conversations about shared interests and beliefs. This is the time of year where many people will be inviting loved ones to their tables, including people that you may not get along with. It is a time of sharing and gratitude.

It's also a time of being mindful of the people who aren't present at your table. Who do we need to include?

It isn't a numbers game to get people to join the meal, but an invitation to hear from people outside of yourself. This can include people that are physically there but spiritually somewhere else. Ask yourself why they might have bowed out of the conversation? The words we say together can push us together or separate us if we don't pay attention.



Find ways to be more inclusive. Learn more about the ways you speak. Are you speaking in ways to push them aside? Perhaps a topic is triggering for them. Listen to their responses without judgment when they tell you what is going on. Make sure you give them space to speak. Socialization is stressful for many. We are in a world where we mainly communicate with a screen and looking someone in the face can be very stressful. The family meal may be a safe place for you but might not be for the other. Give grace. The potluck is a good way to practice this. Sit with some new people and get to know more than your common circle.

Lead us to the love that holds us all and is with us always;

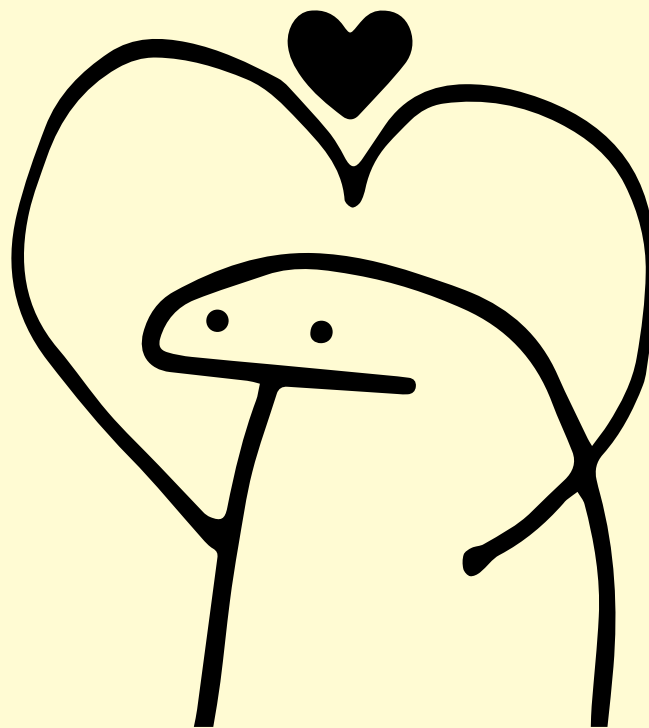
The love that can help us through

the messy and necessary life-altering work

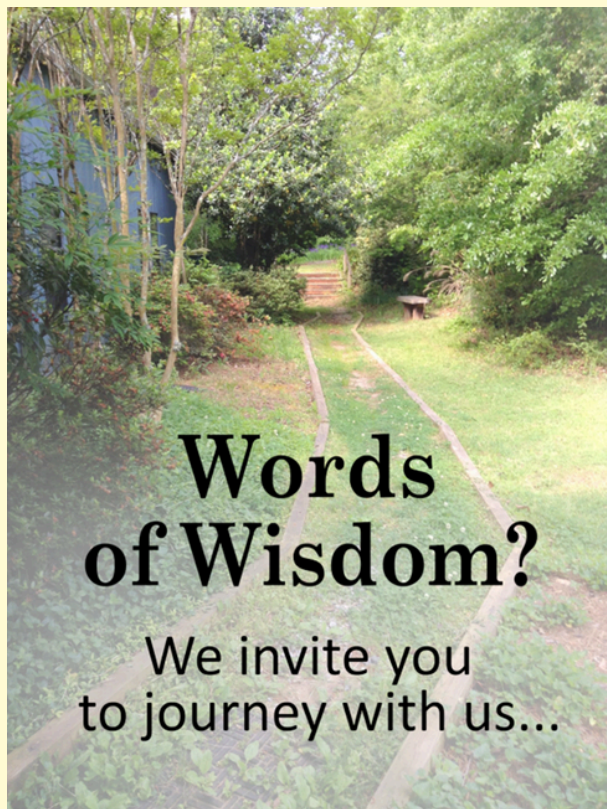
of building movements across beliefs, across difference,

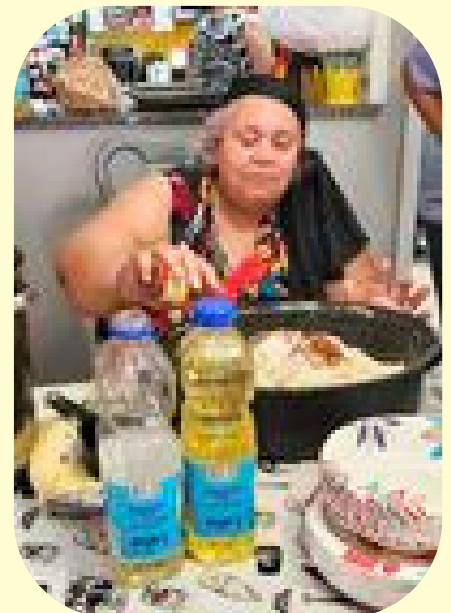

Restoring Balance with Repair *Candice Carver (she/her)*

How do you live love through the practice of repair? What steps can you take to honor Native peoples and contribute to healing the wounds of history, not just in words, but in action? The journey begins with reflection and continues through our daily choices.

Living love through the practice of repair invites us to confront historical and present injustices with humility and a commitment to healing. On Native American Heritage Day, November 29th, we are able to reflect on the histories and cultures of Indigenous peoples and the enduring impacts of colonization on their communities. In Georgia, the Muscogee (Creek), Cherokee, and Yuchi tribes have lived on these lands for centuries, shaping the region's heritage. Yet, their stories are often overshadowed by a history of displacement, broken treaties, and cultural erasure. The practice of repair asks us to face these realities with honesty and open hearts.

The upcoming Native American Festival and Pow Wow at Stone Mountain provides an opportunity to honor Native cultures and learn from the wisdom and resilience of Indigenous peoples. Pow Wows are more than celebrations; they are gatherings for cultural exchange, healing, and community. By participating, we can begin to bridge gaps of misunderstanding and contribute to the ongoing work of reconciliation. Repair, in this context, means showing up—not just as spectators but as learners, allies, and advocates for justice.

Living love through repair in relation to Native communities involves more than one

day of recognition or participation in cultural events. It requires a long-term commitment to understanding Indigenous histories, amplifying Native voices, and supporting efforts for cultural preservation and sovereignty. We can start by educating ourselves on the forced removal of tribes such as the Cherokee during the Trail of Tears and learning about contemporary Native issues like land rights and health disparities. Engaging with Native-led organizations, supporting Indigenous businesses, and advocating for policies that honor Native sovereignty are all tangible ways to live our love through the practice of repair.

This year, we can deepen our practice of repair by reflecting on how we uphold systems that perpetuate harm and asking ourselves how we can contribute to healing. Repair is not just about saying sorry—it's about taking steps to restore balance and build a more just world. It involves listening deeply to the needs of those harmed, making amends where possible, and working toward equity.

October 31st to November 3rd Stone Mountain hosts the native American Festival and Pow Wow. This event showcases Native American culture through dance, music, authentic craft demonstrations, cooking traditions, storytelling, wildlife presentations and more.
