

First Steps Toward Healing: Being Honest About Our Feelings



~ Reflections on Our July 21 Conversation ~ by Rev. Nancy Palmer Jones (she/her)

On Sunday, July 21, 2024, here at UUCG we held a congregational conversation about how each of us is feeling in the face of uncertainty. Congregants and visitors filled in the blanks on this sentence:

"When I think about the uncertainty in this country, I feel _____ because _____."

"Scared" showed up most often, with "sad,"
"threatened," "angry," "terrified," "frightened," and
"fear" close behind. The word cloud offers a visual
representation of the feelings expressed that day. The
larger the word, the more often it was chosen.


We're scared about our own and our loved ones' survival and well-being. Members of LGBTQ+ communities dread worsening discrimination and the possible need to move. Many fear losing their health care. The happiness of future generations is at risk. The sense of powerlessness drags at people's spirits.

A few people mentioned feeling "confident," "fearless," or "secure" because of their faith in Jesus . These voices may have come from visitors we had that day, or perhaps some of our own Christian UUs feel that sense of grounding. These responses invite us all to ask: What grounding do we Unitarian Universalists have in common that might offer us a sense of security in hard times? What can we depend on in our faith? What fuels us in uncertain times?

The political landscape has changed since July 21. Still, we know that the November election will not magically transform uncertainty into certainty; no one leader has that power. Our work this year is to find our way to resilience, healing, and liberation for everyone, even in the face of uncertainty. Being honest about our feelings is a first step.

Prentis Hemphill, in What It Takes to Heal: How Transforming Ourselves Can Change the World, says that uncertainty is actually an opportunity to reshape and realign ourselves. We can become more alive to our bodies and our emotions. Enlivened bodies increase our capacity to relate to one another and the world around us. Sharing our emotions makes us feel less alone. "Our emotional selves are not inconsequential to liberation; they are foundational," Hemphill says. Here's to a year of healing and liberation!

Please join us on the first Sunday of each month, beginning in October, to explore these questions, and the many possibilities each offers to make our community more Curious, more Courageous, more Compassionate in a world that needs it.


Ministry of Radical Welcome





CUUPS Tree Blessing Ritual

Whether we are aware of it or not, trees are magnificent and life giving beings who share this planet with us. They are not optional beings. They actually keep the atmosphere that we need and the ground on which we walk in place and sustain us moment by moment. Trees have been at this for millions of years. At this CUUPS ritual for the blessing of trees, we will offer a blessing to the trees in our grove behind UUCG, and give blessings to trees that are special to each of us who gather.

We invite you to bring a small bit of bread and wine (or grape juice) as offerings to the trees; drums and rattles to help with the ritual, and if you like, a camp chair for sitting in the grove.

Autumn Equinox/Alban Elued Ritual

Alban Elued marks the balance of day and night before the darkness overtakes the light. It is also the time of the second harvest, usually of the fruit which has stayed on the trees and plants that have ripened under the summer sun. It is this final harvest which can take the central theme of the Alban Elued ceremony – thanking the Earth, in her full abundance as Mother and Giver, for the great harvest, as Autumn begins, and the balance of the world.

Alban Elued
The Light of Water


The Autumn Equinox is known by many names in many traditions around the world, including the Fall or September Equinox, Mabon, Feast of Avalon, and more. For Druids, it is known as Alban Elued (or Elfed) – the Light of the Water.

Alban Elued is a special day. As one of the equinoxes, it is one of two times in the year where the amount of day and night are equal, marking a more stark shift between seasons. It is the time to thank and bid farewell to Summer, and begin to turn to prepare and welcome the dark of Winter. Alban Elued is the second harvest festival, and in addition to continuing to dance in the theme of abundance from last month's Lughnasadh, it heralds the themes of gratitude, preparation, and balance.

When one considers balance, one might consider it alongside stillness. But more often than not, balance is not a silent moment in perfect stillness. Balance frequently requires a consistent effort to maintain. When we try to literally balance, we are constantly shifting to keep it going. Slight movements. Big ones. Waving our arms when we might be close to losing balance. When seeking balance in our

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
busy, everyday lives, we shift and adjust, finding balance between obligation or other requirements, and what relaxes us and are activities we do for the joy of it. Work life and home life. 
Balance could certainly be found in the stillness - that moment of calm or of awe. Balance could also look more like tiny shifts, pivots, or greater even huge! - waves. A life in motion.

It has become tradition for our Grove, Sylvan Sanctuary, to enter into a more contemplative ritual for Alban Elued. A large spiral is carefully laid out on the floor with a cauldron, full of water, at the center. Around the spiral will be altars to the directions, and our ritual will be performed in part around this spiral and down in the grove (weather permitting). As soft drumming sounds, we will spend time in quiet, personal reflection as we walk in and out of the spiral to seek answers to a question.

This ritual will be held on Saturday, September 21st, at 6:00pm. It is a public event and all who wish to join us are invited to participate. Please bring an offering to Mother Earth, canned goods for The Lawrenceville Co-Op, and a potluck dish to share after the ritual.

A Tarot Deck is a tiny art gallery filled with 78 images that can be used in many ways. Just flipping through a deck can be a calming, meditative act. The images evoke feelings and thoughts, spark ideas, recall the past, and offer a tantalizing view to possible paths and journeys.. Carl Jung, the Swiss founder of analytical psychology said, "...man (has) always felt the need of finding an access through the unconscious to the meaning of an actual condition, because there is a sort of correspondence or a likeness between the prevailing condition and the condition of the collective unconscious." As another mystical psychologist, Alejandro Jodorowsky, puts it, "the Tarot will teach you how to create a soul."

- 2. Exploring universal Archetypes in order to recognize the commonalities of all humans
- 3. Improving focus for setting Intentions

Protection Spell Jar

The fall is upon us and with that the sun creeps ever closer to edge we find the desire for more spiritual protection. This spell jar is intended to give you overall feeling of protection.

Ingredients:

- jar any size
- dried sage
- dried rosemary
- 6 dried start anise
- 9 dried juniper berries
- 3 acorns
- sea salt
- a small piece of tourmaline or another protection crystal
- a piece of silver wire or chain from a silver necklace
- choose other protection herbs if you want
 - a small mirror
- white candle
- lighter or matches
- tourmaline or another a permanent marker

Use the permanent marker to add a protection symbol of your choosing to the bottom of the jar.

Layer the bottom of the jar with salt, tourmaline or other crystal, the small mirror (if small enough), rosemary, acorns, sage, juniper berries, and the optional other protection herb, the star anise, and another layer of salt.

Close the lid tightly and wrap the silver wire or chain around the jar, however feels right to you. Light your candle, if your mirror was too large attach it to the lid or base with candle wax.

Attach the candle to the lid using wax.

Take 5 deep breaths. Open your eyes and focus on the candle flame. Focus on a feeling of protection. Think of a time when you felt absolutely calm and safe. Once you've entered this feeling focus that energy on the jar, imagine the feelings of protection as a bright light and direct that into the jar. Once the jar is filled to the brim with this protective light say: "I call on the herbs and crystals to imbue this jar with protective magick. Salt

shield me, mirror aid me in defense, candle transform negativity around me and protect me and all that dwell within the vicinity."

Let the candle burn out or down and blow out and set in the centeral area of your home.



On September 8th, UUCG will host its own REN FAIRE! – or VOLUNTEEREN' FAIRE!





Create Some Good Trouble and Reclaim the Power of Love

Power, as defined by Alica Garza one of my personal sheroes, "is the ability to impact and affect the conditions of your own life and the lives of others."

How do we create non-hierarchical power structures to most positively influence our community? We are in a sea of hierarchies. Not just the corporations and government but most of our organizations. We are in a sea of people who have wealth, resources and goods. We are in a sea of advertising for seeking the same wealth, resources and goods. We are in a sea of people trying to get their pieces of the wealth, resources and goods. At the same time, we see the inequities from amassed power without accountability. I believe that we can use people power to organize for people and with purpose to impact our own lives and each other's lives.

Our UU Congregationalist structure allows for less hierarchy. We are not controlled by the UUA, but we follow their guidance. They have the power of the message and the power of purpose, and it is a message and purpose that is influenced by each of us. We have a leader, but she does not put edicts provides ministerial out: she organizational guidance. Her power comes from living the Universalist messages of relational accountability and universal grace and love. Her power comes from us as we elected her to this guidance role. Our Regional Office does not have power over us, but we grant them power to provide guidance and support to us. We elect our board to administer our funds and mission to best live into our UU values and history. We accept our Lay Ministers to accountably provide us guidance and support. The power they do have over us is granted

through policies and democratic processes. They have power of the people; the people of UUCG – members and friends who are committed to live and worship in covenant with each other. Our leaders are sometimes seen in the same way we see government and corporate leaders. We expect them to act that way because that is what we see in the world all around us. Sometimes they act that way because that is what they see in the world all around us. We are challenged in UUism accountable in to be relationship with each other, with our leaders, and with our larger UU community to remain accountable because the power we hold has the potential to really impact lives: our own and others.

We can organize our UU people power into voting power through influence power. Voting to live out Equity, Justice, and Pluralism to Transform our community into the beloved community. We must vote with our compassion. Living out our Generosity and knowledge Interdependence to create Climate Justice through our vote. The work to create the power of influence takes time and relationship building. That means Love must remain at the core of every effort we make. This is the kind of Trouble - Good Trouble that will change our community and with the help of our UU the Vote Allies and Southern Region experts - each of us can make some Good Trouble. We must be accountable with each other that we are remaining true to our values and doing what each of us can (and maybe push ourselves a little bit more) to make that Good Trouble. If we don't remain accountable, we will lose our power of influence. Let our values be our guide as we do the work to become designated a Good




